Camera Settings

Aperture Priority Mode:

Select an aperture between f/1.4 and f/2.8 to create the typical bokeh effect – a blurred background while your subject remains sharply focused.

ISO:

Keep the ISO as low as possible, ideally between ISO 100 and 400, to minimize noise and achieve high image quality. In low-light conditions, you can increase it up to ISO 1600, but avoid higher values to prevent noise.

Manual focus:

Focus manually to ensure sharpness on your main subject – a technique essential for achieving the classic Leica look.

Lenses

Use prime lenses such as 35 mm or 50 mm. These focal lengths offer a natural perspective and provide the sharp details and soft bokeh that define the Leica style.

Avoid zoom lenses, as they do not offer the same optical precision and image quality as prime lenses.

Bokeh and Depth of Field

An **aperture** between f/1.4 and f/2.8 creates a soft, blurred background (bokeh), while keeping the main subject in the foreground sharp. Experiment with the distance between the subject and the background to enhance the effect.

Image Composition

Minimalism:

Keep the composition simple by removing unnecessary elements and focusing on clean lines. This directs attention to the main subject.

Golden Ratio and Rule of Thirds:

Use these classic rules to create a balanced and harmonious image composition.

Fill the Frame:

Boldly bring your subject to the forefront and fill the frame to emphasize the Leica style.

Light and Shadow

Use natural light:

Especially during the Golden Hour (shortly after sunrise or before sunset), you'll get warm, soft light, perfect for achieving the Leica look.

Short shutter speeds:

Use shutter speeds between 1/500 and 1/1000 seconds to freeze motion and capture fleeting moments with sharp clarity—ideal for street photography.

Filter & Post-Processing

Polarizing filter:

Enhances colors and reduces reflections, perfect for landscape and street photography.

ND filter (neutral density filter):

Allows longer exposure times in bright light to achieve smooth and harmonious images.

Color filters:

Adjust contrast and color effects to give your photos a special touch.

Post-Processing

With the right apps and tools, you can perfect the Leica look in post-processing. Here's a step-by-step guide:

Import Image:

Upload your photo to the editing app of your choice (e.g., VSCO, Lightroom Mobile, or Snapseed).

Make Basic Adjustments:
